College to break ground on housing

Planning and preparation for a 47-unit student residence in Haliburton's Glebe Park is almost complete, with a member of Fleming College's senior administration saying he expects to break ground on the project this fall.

Drew Van Parys, executive vice president

of corporate services and marketing at Fleming, which operates the Haliburton School of Art + Design, said the \$16 million build has been supported by the college's board of governors and is pending provincial approval.

"We're ready to go. Once we get the go-ahead to invest the funds, we'll have

a formal groundbreaking. We expect the approval will be straightforward and are hoping to hear back in the next 60 to 90 days," Van Parys said. "In the meantime, there will be some activity on campus starting within the next month as we begin some of the staging work."

The project has been in the works for

years and was brought to the public in 2021, when college staff approached Dysart et al township about building on a 3.7-acre plot in the park. The project was supported by the municipality in March 2022, with Dysart donating the land.

Phase one will feature two, three-storey

buildings, containing 47 units, Van Parys said. There will be one-bedroom and two-bedroom options, with each unit fitted with a bathroom and small kitchenette. Van Parys said some of the ground level suites will be accessible for people with disabilities.

Fleming is anticipating a one-year construction window, with occupancy January 2025.

"It's great news for students, it's great news for Fleming College, and it's great news for Haliburton. While 47 beds doesn't sound like much, it's going to have a definite impact on the total inventory of spaces available in the County," Van Parys said.

Dysart et al mayor Murray Fearrey agreed, saying this news was a "big win" for the community.

"Having these units here, it'll create a lot of rental space in the community that was being taken up by students. It's going to have a positive impact on housing in Haliburton, no question about it," Fearrey said. "With this investment, Fleming College is going to be a long-term player in Haliburton, and I'm grateful for that."

The mayor said he'd like to see the college supplement its arts programming with offerings in other areas, such as the trades. He said he's talked to Fleming College staff, including new dean Xavier Massé, about expanding the school's

"I think you're going to see a change. The arts are wonderful, and the college brings a lot of people to our community, but if we can have a mix that benefits our community... and opens more career opportunities for people, I think that would be a good thing," Fearrey said.

Van Parys was non-committal when asked about specific programs, but noted Fleming is working on a revitalization strategy for the Haliburton campus, which he said includes the possibility of new programming. Once the new student residence is online, he said the campus would also be offering

corporate retreats and arts-based conferences.

Fleming president, Maureen Adamson, told Dysart council

last year the three-phase development, totalling more than 90 units, was a major part of the institution's longterm plans in Haliburton.

Fearrey said he wasn't worried about Fleming backtracking on phases two and three.

"The cost of building has gone through the roof since they committed to this. There are projected costs the college had and I'm sure they had to look at it and figure out what to do," Fearrey said. "The demand also needs to be there.

So, build the first phase, see how it goes, and go from there. That's a reasonable business approach."



Van Parys said a second and third phase, which would bring two further buildings and 47 additional units, has been shelved.

"We're not considering that at this time. We'll see how this project goes, but that is not in our immediate

planning window," he said. "Hopefully, demand and growth will drive the need for that phase sooner rather than later."

Haliburton village to get 18 new apartments

County council stamped its approval on a proposed 18-unit apartment complex for downtown Haliburton Aug. 16.

Dysart et al has already given Hot Pond Enterprises Inc. the go-ahead to build at the corner of Maple Avenue and Victoria Street, across the highway from SIRCH Community Services.

The project has been on the books for some time now, with *The Highlander* last writing about it on July 30, 2021.

This week, County council was dealing with an official plan (OP) amendment, from commercial areas to urban residential areas. Dysart passed its OP amendment at an April 25, 2023 meeting.

In his report, director of planning Steve Stone said, "each building will contain two, one-bedroom suites, two, two-bedroom suites, and two, three-bedroom suites. Two of the suites in each building will be offered as affordable units, while the remaining will be offered at market value."

He added the development is to be constructed in three phases, with each building being considered a phase. The northernmost building will be constructed first as phase one, and the middle and southernmost buildings will comprise phase two and phase three.

Hot Pond Enterprises corporation president Richard Carson appeared on Zoom during the meeting and said, "I think this project ... is an example of how we have an opportunity to lift up the services in Haliburton, in the town itself, for our residents."

He added the four lots had been vacant for at least 15 years and their proposal was a solution for a "huge" need for rental housing in the town. "Not condominiums, but housing for families, seniors, professionals working in our community."

Stone noted the apartments will be hooked up to town sewer and the developer will have to sink three new wells for water. There will be a new entrance from Victoria Street. Stone said all technical studies had gone to Dysart et al, and been peer reviewed. The only outstanding piece is Dysart must still do a zoning bylaw amendment. It will address thing such as setbacks, parking spaces, and building height. A holding provision will also be added for other planning approvals, such as site plan control and a drinking water agreement.

In circulating the plan to agencies and the public, the Haliburton, Kawartha, Pine Ridge District Health Unit commented the location, "will enable residents to use active transportation to access essential services, recreation and participate in the community."

The health unit added it hopes the municipality will collect cash in lieu of park land to pay for improved active transportation infrastructure in this area.

The health unit further noted the apartments will see more walkers in the area, with some key destinations across the road, such as a Chinese restaurant, the SIRCH Bistro, Fleming CREW, County Social Services and

St. Anthony's Catholic Church.

"A pedestrian crossover is strongly recommended at this location to facilitate safer crossing for residents... a crosswalk was requested at this location several years ago after an individual was struck and killed by a driver," the health unit said. They want to ensure accessibility and want the developer to consider bike racks for the apartments.

Stone said the build fits nicely with municipal housing policies, as one-third will be affordable housing.

"The development will be located within Haliburton village, which is a service centre containing medical, professional, personal and social services, education, retail commercial and employment opportunities. The central location within the village and proximity to the retail core will also afford occupants of the buildings with opportunities for walking and biking."

Convictions for illegal hunting in Minden

Two men from southwestern Ontario have been convicted in connection with the illegal hunt of a deer on private property along Duck Lake Road in Minden in the fall of 2018.

The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) said on Aug. 11 that Luigi Centurami of Stoney Creek pleaded guilty to trespassing and possessing unlawfully killed wildlife. He was fined \$6,000.

Steve Tsiliganos, also of Stoney Creek, pleaded guilty to trespassing, possessing a loaded firearm within eight metres of a roadway, and possessing illegally killed wildlife. He was fined \$4,000.

The court heard that on Nov. 14, 2018, conservation officers investigated information of a deer that had been shot on private property along Duck Lake Road near the town of Minden.

"It was determined that Centurami and Tsiliganos were travelling together in a pickup truck along the road when Tsiliganos exited the vehicle and shot a white-tailed deer on land that was posted as private property. Both individuals accessed the property to retrieve the deer," the MNRF said.

The investigation involved a conservation officer canine unit, the OPP Forensic Identification Services, and the Trent University Wildlife DNA Forensics Lab.

Justice of the Peace, Mark Donohue, heard Centurami's case remotely on May 24, 2023 and Justice of the Peace Herbert Radtke heard the Tsiliganos case remotely on October 17, 2022, both in the Ontario Court of Justice in Lindsay.

The MNRF said that to report a natural resource problem or provide information about an unsolved case, members of the public can call the ministry TIPS line toll free at 1-877-847-7667. Playground progressing

Fencing was installed and a gravel pathway laid at Head Lake Park earlier this month as workers prepared the site for the arrival of new playground equipment. Dysart recreation coordinator, Andrea Mueller, said installers arrived in Haliburton Aug. 15 to begin piecing things together. She said work should be complete within two to three weeks. The new 9,000 sq. ft. facility will feature a jungle gym, log climbing structure, 100-foot zip line, and several standalone play features such as seesaws, a merry-go-round and animal rockers. There will also be an accessible play area for people with wheelchairs. The existing swing sets will remain in place. The total cost of the project is almost \$589,000, Mueller said, with Dysart township contributing \$300,000, Ontario Trillium Foundation providing a \$150,000 grant, Haliburton Rotary chipping in \$50,000, and the remaining \$89,000 coming via community donations. Mueller said the playground should be finished and open to the public by early September.

Nothing looney about this nighttime rescue

When loon aficionado Kevin K. Pepper was on the south end of Salerno Lake recently, he noticed a loon in a place they don't normally frequent this time of year.

He said he knew something was wrong. Paying closer attention, the prolific loon photographer noticed the bird was having mobility issues.

The next day, a couple of kayakers made a similar observation and took some photos of what appeared to be fishing line wrapped around the loon's wing and foot.

Pepper boated back down and took some images of his own. A daytime rescue was attempted, where you get the loon in a boat, cover it, and remove the line. However, "an injured loon will not allow you to get that close," he said.

He tapped into loon resources he has in the U.S. He sent an email to them and within 20 minutes got a call from one of them. His contact said it sounded like he had to do a night rescue.

"My contact walked me through the whole procedure, where you shine the light on its eyes and it freezes the loon and you go through the process of capturing it and getting the line off it.

"I thought OK, I'm going to need help with this because it sounds like a big task. I threw out a posting on the Salerno Facebook page, and I listed that I needed a small boat, a trailer and a Musky net and lights. "All of a sudden, the lake people jumped on this thing, which was awesome."

Pepper said he pulled together two teams of three people in two small boats. They met Friday night, Aug. 11, at 10 p.m.

He said after about 40 minutes on the water, they located the loon on shore.

"Loons will beach themselves when injured. Like surgeons, the team began to remove the fishing line. We then discovered a four-inch lure up under the wing. Carefully, with delicate hands and tools, the lure was removed. Removing the remainder of the net and lifting the blanket, the loon made its way to the water. It began to swim, dive and actually went up with extended wings. I believe the loon will make a full recovery. There didn't seem to be any apparent wing damage," Pepper said.

He said the loon team consisted of Douglas A. Rodger, Larry Wren, Kim Stuart, Robert Landry, Kenneth Clark, McMann Marnie and Robert Stuart. He added they had shore line support from Chris Gillespie and Tom Clarke. "This incredible team worked so well together and the result was a loon was saved."

Pepper, who loves to photograph the loons of Salerno Lake, said he was "just over the moon. It was just crazy unbelievable."

He's been sharing the story and has sent information back to the U.S. teams.

"This is just a good story and it just promotes loon awareness, which we desperately need."

Benthic monitoring continuing

Crowe Valley Conservation Authority (CVCA) general manager, Tim Pidduck, presented to council on new rules for conservation authorities under Bill 23.

Of interest to the public, he said, is the authority continuing to do benthic monitoring on behalf of the township.

They've been doing it, but have to financially account for it in a different way, Pidduck said. It's important to evaluate benthic macroinvertebrates as they are commonly used as indicators of the biological condition of water bodies, he added.

Some work now requires the signing of memorandums of understanding, including benthic monitoring and Highlands East hiring the authority for risk management.

Council agreed to continue the monitoring and pledged support of approximately \$1,200 a year, possibly less if there are federal grants.

Ryall said, "I think for \$6,000 over a five-year period... are our lakes worth that much? And my answer is yes.'

Pidduck thanked the council, saying, "this is very important work for the authority to continue to do to offer to you folks, and of course your residents, to know that this benthic monitoring does play an important

Public works manager, Perry Kelly, said staff met with Peter North from North Design Office to work together to build and advertise a tender document to complete the required work within the park.


He added staff had engaged a local contractor to clear and remove dead trees and small growth to prepare the property for the

He said the work would be completed this fall along with the tender advertisement and award to complete work within the park.

On the hunt for Bigfoot

Cal Saari's place looks like the sort of locale where one might see a sasquatch. His century old farmhouse down a sideroad in Minden boasts an impressive work shed and a sauna. true to his Finnish ancestry. A juvenile male dog runs up and down a long lead. Everywhere there is bush and quiet.

Saari leans back against the woodshed door, his weathered face topped by a ball cap, and shares the story of a night around the campfire with the boys.

His brother's friend went into the bush to answer the call of nature. He was gone a long time. Too long. Just as they were contemplating a search party, he emerged. He didn't look particularly upset, fairly calm actually.

Saari asked him where he'd been.

"I was out back talking to your neighbour." Saari told him, "there's no neighbours out back. There's nothing out back. There's rocks and trees and it's pitch black out there."

"No, no, your neighbour, the big guy named Sven," he retorted.

"Huh? Til this day I'm still trying to figure that one out," says Cal, scratching his head. "So, if I run into sasquatch, I know his name. It's Sven."

The Trent University Sasquatch Society was in the Highlands this past week interviewing people who said they'd had encounters with Sasquatch, otherwise known as Bigfoot, or Sesquac or Witiko or Wendigo, in some Native Canadian languages.

Saari was one who had answered their request for encounters with the large, ape-like creature that lives in forests. It's believed Bigfoot may exist somewhere in the wild, but its present existence is disputed or unsubstantiated by science. Like the Yeti of Asia or the Abominable Snowman of the Himalayas, Sasquatch is rooted in Indigenous legend and commonly researched by cryptozoologists and enthusiasts. Some believe Sasquatch is a nearly extinct species of hominid that survives in isolation, while others consider the creature to be the product of folklore and a hoax.

On Aug. 12 in Minden, we are among the converted. Society president Ryan Willis said they talked to 10 people. He was in the County with Benjamin Blanc and Joel Porter. They are just about done collecting accounts of sightings and are creating a pilot television show episode about their discoveries.

There are other accounts from Haliburton County on the Bigfoot Field Researchers Organization and Sasquatch Chronicle websites; and a book, Tales of the Haliburton Sasquatch, on Amazon. Shawn Butchart

has a "Bigfoot field research team" line of clothes at Blue Moon Gift Shop. He told The Highlander last year, "I think Bigfoot is very relevant to the local culture and contributes to the magical quality of life in Haliburton."

'Coolest subject ever'

Saari next shares stories about hearing an unusual tree knocking in the woods. "It's like two baseball bats hitting together as opposed to a low resonance noise," he shares. The society has also heard suspicious sounds, and deploy a technique called wood knocking. They take a stick and whack it against a tree and make a sound to get Bigfoot's attention and draw it in. They have yet to see a sasquatch. Saari then talks about two of his dogs avoiding a part of the forest.

Prior to visiting Saari, the trio were at a property about 30 minutes away. Willis said the family wanted to remain anonymous to local media but, over a period of 80 years, said they had seen four or five different sasquatches.

"The earliest one was at an apple tree, one crossing the road, one was looking into the house through the windows. We get a lot of people having them looking through the window." He said they heard a similar story

near Algonquin Park last week and someone in the North Bay-Sudbury area shared a photo of a Bigfoot looking in their hunt camp window. They've talked to a number of Indigenous people in the making of the pilot as well.

Willis, said he's excited for people to see their pilot.

"The Bigfoot subject is a misunderstood thing, especially in Ontario. I think it is better understood in British Columbia. I think it will be a really cool show for people when it comes out. I really hope it changes people's minds... shows people it's not just something crazy people see from time to time. A lot of people that are smart and educated see this stuff and there is documented evidence of it. We're going to be featuring a lot of that.

"I think people will be impressed. There's a lot of evidence that no one's seen yet that will be in the show."

They believe the show will be televised the week of Sept. 25 on the Wild TV channel but are awaiting exact dates and times.

It's a bit of a dream come true for Willis, who has always been "super interested" since the age of 11 or 12 when he discovered Finding Bigfoot. "I just fell in love with it. I thought it was the coolest subject ever."

The Highlander Progress on housing

There's been some encouraging news development-wise in Haliburton County recently.

In this week's edition, there are updates on a pair of projects that could add 65 residential units to Haliburton's housing inventory. The first is a proposed 18-unit development to be built on the corner of Maple Avenue and Victoria Street in the village's downtown, with a third of those to be designated affordable.

The other is the long-touted student residence to be constructed inside Glebe Park. This will create 47 units for would-be Fleming College scholars, a much-needed win given the struggles students have securing housing in the area.

There will be a trickle-down benefit to all Highlanders once the dorm buildings are complete – it should reduce competition for the few rentals available in town. It may also help with the ongoing labour crisis. If students know they have a place to live, they may be more inclined to study in Haliburton. Maybe they look for a part-time job while they're here.

It's been around 18 months since 2021 Census data was released. As reported by The Highlander in February 2022, the County's population ballooned almost 14 per cent between 2016 and 2021. This has led to

our housing market increasing by more than 50 per cent, more in our urban centres and on the water, pricing many would-be buyers out, and creating a huge run on all rental properties.

There is reason to be optimistic, though. As well as the aforementioned developments, the province has announced a new 128-bed facility for Extendicare Haliburton. The Gardens of Haliburton is close to completing its second phase of development, adding 34 extra units. There's also the proposed Kawartha Lakes Haliburton Housing Corporation build in Minden, which will see 35 units added along Hwy. 35 between Rotary Park and the legion once it receives provincial approval.

Our local councils have been busy too. Algonquin Highlands modified its housing legislation to allow for things like tiny homes, while promoting secondary units. Minden Hills has followed suit, amending its official plan and zoning bylaws to allow up to three residences on eligible properties. Dysart et al and Highlands East are also investigating loosening their housing rules.

But more is needed. There's hope that the Eastern Ontario Wardens Caucus' proposed Seven in Seven' initiative, aiming to bring 7,000 new affordable rental units online across 13 counties in eastern Ontario over

the next seven vears, will take off. Under that plan, the County could expect to see 490 new rentals by 2031. The initiative has received support from a slew of

municipalities since it was tabled in April but is yet to get off the ground.

Places for People is raising \$850,000 in community bonds this summer, which it says will be used to help the organization bring more affordable housing online. The organization has plans to build 15 new units on the shores of Grass Lake, should the 88-unit Harburn Holdings development, approved by Dyart and County councils this year, survive a provincial review.

Then there's the Wigamog. Slated for demolition last year, owners Aurora Group have long touted the land could one day house a new 180-unit subdivision. While that may never see the light of day, who's to say the land couldn't be used to create muchneeded housing?

While we're nowhere near solving the Highlands' housing woes, it's encouraging to see progress is being made.

CLIMATE CORNER

Deadly heat: uninhabitable Earth

El Nino, a predictable cyclical global warming phenomenon, has started (World Meteorological Organization). The last El Niño was in 2015-16. "The onset of El Niño will greatly increase the likelihood of breaking temperature records and triggering more extreme heat in many parts of the world and in the ocean," WMOs secretarygeneral said. "The declaration... is the signal to governments around the world to mobilize preparations to limit the impacts on our health, our ecosystems and our economies."

So far, 2023 earth surface and marine surface temperatures are "off the charts" (NASA, NOAA, Berkeley Earth, Hadley), modelling a 98 per cent chance of 2023 being the warmest year on record. The central estimate is 1.42C above 1850-1899 levels (range 1.35C to 1.50C), and a 2.5 per cent chance that 2023 exceeds 1.5C.

Global warming is humans' legacy of burning fossil fuels. Rising sea levels, wildfires, droughts are secondary events resulting from the primary event: heating planet Earth.

SOLUTIONS:

Number one: stop extracting and burning fossil fuels. Transition to renewables now. Governments around the world are setting goals and creating policy to make this transition.

For years, we have used afforestation (planting new forests) and reforestation (preserving forests) to help absorb and store CO2. Trees, grasslands, wetlands, and other ecosystems absorb CO2 with growth. But

trees cannot grow fast enough to offset the CO2 in our atmosphere.

Ocean Iron Fertilization introduces iron into low-iron ocean areas, increasing phytoplankton. Phytoplankton absorb CO2 with growth, storing it in the deep ocean when they die. Efficiency, cost, consequences unknown.

Heat is the cost of human civilization. Until we stop emitting CO2 into the atmosphere, warming continues. Because CO2 stays in the atmosphere for thousands of years, stopping emissions won't cool the planet or reverse warming; it will only stop the increase. Until we figure out how to remove CO2 from the atmosphere, Earth will be hot.

To date, there are no efficient, effective, affordable solutions. But plenty of hopeful technologies.

Geoengineering is an umbrella term for interventions that could reduce the amount of warming that Earth is experiencing because of heat-trapping gases in the atmosphere. There are two large categories of geoengineering: Carbon Dioxide Removal (CCS, DAC, below) and Solar Radiation

Carbon capture and storage (CCS) technologies collect CO2 from burning fossil fuels, injecting it deep underground or turning it into other uses. Capturing CO2 from smokestacks at industrial and power plants involves compression to a liquid form and transportation by ship or pipeline to a storage site (2,500 feet down used-up oil and gas reservoirs, or geological "wells"). This

is energy-consuming and costly. Finding uses for captured CO2 may reduce cost.

The main use for CO2 today is

to pump into oil wells, flushing out hardto-extract oil. Pure CO2 is also used in greenhouses to grow plants. Companies and labs are turning CO2 into plastics, building materials, carbon fibers, household products (baking soda, bleach, antifreeze, inks, paints). Others experiment with CO2 to grow algae or bacteria, making biofuels and fertilizers and animal feed.

Capturing CO2 from the atmosphere is called direct air capture (DAC) and uses either chemical processes, or biomass (via photosynthesis). The concentration of CO2 in the air is 300 times less than in smokestacks, making it much less efficient and costly to

Solar Radiation Management techniques (some theoretical) reflect sun's rays into space, reducing heat entering Earth's

Examples: Increasing Albedo by making surfaces (roofs, roads) white; Cloud Seeding which sprays particles into low clouds (over oceans), increasing brightness and reflection; Cirrus Thinning which breaks up high cirrus clouds that trap heat; Stratospheric Aerosol Injection which sprays particles into the upper atmosphere, above the clouds; Space Mirrors which orbit Earth.

Regarding your editorial, OPP create more victims, The Highlander, Aug. 10, 2023.








Kash Lake art beats the rain

Chicken Soup author 'blessed' to call Hali home

Haliburton's Patricia Miller has been part of the Chicken Soup for the Soul family for awhile now, with her latest short story appearing in a bowl of All You Need is Love.

The latest book, released May 30, features 101 stories of romance, serendipity, divine intervention and destiny "and plenty of hope, too," says Shelby Janner, chief publicity officer for Zilker Media's Chicken Soup for the Soul.

Miller, who moved to her Lake Kashagawigamog cottage full-time this spring, wrote a story called Catching Snowflakes that appears in the book.

She said she was "touched" when she received an email saying they'd selected her story for inclusion in the

The tale is about how she met her former husband, Ian. Her car broke down in winter and Ian and his family came to the rescue. She emailed the family the next day, with contact details to be given to Ian.

However, Ian's parents did not pass along the information as he already had a girlfriend. He only found out about the email months later, when he was single, and gave Patricia a call to meet up on St Patrick's Day. They were engaged eight months later and married Oct. 3, 1998.

Patricia said the story was originally published in Chicken Soup for the Soul: O Canada The Wonders of Winter in 2013.

"There's nothing quite as rewarding as holding a book in your hands that showcases your story in print. Not only do Chicken Soup for the Soul books delight their readers, they also make writers' dreams come true," she said.

Other books where her stories appear are: Chicken Soup for the Soul: Christmas in Canada, Chicken Soup for the Soul: The Spirit of Canada, and Chicken Soup for the Soul: Dreams and the Unexplainable.

Miller said she's proud to be part of the *Chicken Soup for* the Soul family.

Miller has been cottaging in Haliburton her entire life. "Our Haliburton cottage has always been my favourite place. I'm blessed.'

She said her dad and his brother were best friends and neighbours who worked as building contractors in Markham.

They wanted a place to get away and relax after a long work week, so bought side-by-side lots on Lake Kashagawigamog. The families camped on the land until they built the cottages.

They spent every weekend and all of their holidays in Haliburton.

"I fondly remember the days when we had to snowmobile in and out to the cottage with all our supplies in winter and spending entire days snowmobiling all over the area, when there were sea fleas and a trick waterski jump on the lake in summer, and when everyone lined up on the sidewalk at The Molou in town to see a movie," she recalled.

As a teen, she worked at Paulette's gift shop where she shopped with her mom as a child, and often boated to work, tying up at the town docks.

"I love that Haliburton has remained a charming quaint village despite its growth. The arrival of many new businesses and visitors discovering

all that Haliburton offers hasn't changed the friendliness of the locals welcoming them. I'm grateful that the clubhouse sandwich, french fries and gravy and strong coffee at the Kosy Korner hasn't changed since the days when it was located at the corner, and that the arena staff still are kind enough to stock a few pieces of hockey equipment at the rink for when a visiting kid forgets theirs in the garage at home."

Her parents are gone, but the cottage remains, and Miller's children "treasure the simple pleasures of cottage life, like watching shooting stars lying on the dock at night, sleeping in the bunky, and cooking sausages over the campfire.'

Back to writing, and Miller said for her it is a process. She writes first drafts of her stories "from the heart" and leaves the editing for later. "When I write for Chicken Soup for the Soul, I pretend that I'm telling my best friend the story for the first time while she's drinking coffee."

Miller is also a published poet. She's writing new stories to submit for possible publication in upcoming Chicken Soup for the Soul books, and a fiction fantasy novel.

And what of her and Ian?

"Ian and I are now legally separated but it's been amicable and we have remained friends, thankfully, and our children got through it fine. Unfortunately, we grew apart and life is too short to not live it happily. I'm supportive of Ian's new relationship. We're very good to each other."

Kinmount Journey for Health raises \$12,000

There was a celebratory mood swirling around Austin Sawmill Park Aug. 13 as the Kinmount and District Health Centre (KDHC) hosted its 25th annual Journey for Health fundraiser, raking in \$12,000 to support medical services in the community.

More than 75 people attended this year's event, a record according to lead organizer, Kim Restivo Galea. Participants walked, ran, and biked along the Victoria Rail Trail before indulging in a complimentary pancake breakfast, provided by the Kinmount and District Lions Club. The breakfast raised \$246, which the Lions Club donated to KDHC.

"This is always such a great day. I'm thrilled to see the response this year. Being the 25th anniversary, I think this meant a lot to many, many people," Restivo Galea said.

She's been involved on the organizational side for four years but has been a participant for almost two decades. Her mother, Pat Restivo, helped found the event in 1998 and was one of the top fundraisers before her passing in 2005. Now, Kim walks, and works, in her mom's memory.

She raised \$4,700 this year and has collected north of \$50,000 in total.

The Kawartha Lakes Fire Department brought a fire truck to the event, offering tours to children, while the Friends of the Kinmount Library group held a book sale, with proceeds going to KDHC.

The bulk of the money brought in this year

will go towards the community's recruitment efforts, which have paid huge dividends recently, Restivo Galea said. Kinmount welcomed Dr. Lesslie Ponraja in March, who will be taking over Dr. Elena Mihu's patients at the clinic. Dr. Mihu is retiring Aug. 31 after more than 25 years in the community.

The clinic has also welcomed a new physiotherapist, with Vivian Wong-Svoboda joining the team last October. Nurses Wendy West and Mackenzie West have been providing foot care treatments every Tuesday to patients in need, while dental services will soon be provided by The Smile Studio's Mya Zammit, who has offices across Kawartha

"We're growing our clinic and the services we provide, but we can't rest yet," Restivo Galea said. "We really hope now we've been successful bringing a family doctor in from overseas that we can do it again. It was a learning curve, and very costly – we invested approximately \$50,000 getting Dr. Ponraja here - so events like this are huge as we continue our efforts.

"We need to get another family physician here. There are so many people living here without a family doctor, so that has to be our focus. The work begins again," she added. Speaking at the event, Dr. Ponraja said he's been made to feel extremely welcome in Kinmount. He said he has a lot of orthopedic experience and has recently launched joint injection and minor procedure clinics in the community.

"I feel privileged to be here. I'm hoping I'll be here for much more than 25 years," he said. "We're all trying to make a difference in our community, and that's what I hope to do. I want to make sure that, in working here, I am doing anything I can to improve and make services much better."

Acceptance and inclusivity has 'blossomed'

"It's incredible the difference a few years can make," said Allan Guinan, chair of Minden Pride, on how acceptance and inclusivity has blossomed in the Highlands since the organization's founding in 2016.

Now, on the cusp of the eighth annual Pride Week - with festivities running Aug. 21 to 27 - Guinan said the event has become a summertime staple in Haliburton County.

"It's one of the largest cultural festivals we have – in terms of the number of events, the people who attend, and the support we receive from local businesses and our allies. I think it really proves this community, which wasn't necessarily very friendly or open to [the LGBTQ+] community at one time, is embracing us," Guinan said.

A flag raising ceremony will be held at the Minden Hills municipal office Aug. 21 at 11 a.m. to officially kick off the event. Later that day, Minden Pride will host its first annual ecstatic dance social event at Dimensions Algonquin Highlands, running from 6 to 7:30 p.m.

The popular Drag Storytime is back for a double dose, with readings at the Minden Hills library Aug. 22 at 3 p.m. and at the Haliburton library Aug. 24 at 3 p.m. The events have been organized by the Haliburton County Public Library, Guinan noted, and, in recent years, have really helped break down barriers in the community.

A meet and greet is being held at the Bonnie View Inn Aug. 22 from 5 to 9 p.m.,

with queer trivia night at the Dominion Hotel Aug. 24 starting at 7 p.m. An outdoor movie show will commence afterwards, starting at around 9 p.m. at the Minden Hills Cultural Centre.

"This is one of the many new features we have this year – the movie is (*Strange World* starring Jake Gyllenhaal and Dennis Quaid and is) the first Disney LGBTQ+ themed production that has a queer character in it, which is really interesting," Guinan said.

Seeking to include youth wherever possible, Guinan said Minden Pride has partnered with the Haliburton County Youth Wellness Hub to host a Pride breakfast Aug. 23. From 9 a.m. to noon, anyone can stop by the youth hub on Dysart Avenue for pancakes. Donations will be accepted.

"There will be all sorts of activities going on specifically directed towards the youth in the Highlands. We will have pronoun pins for people to pick up and wear with pride," Guinan said. "This is something we've been wanting to do for a long time because, for a lot of the youth in the queer community up here, life can be challenging."

There will also be a complimentary queer hip hop dance class at the Wellness Hub in Haliburton Aug. 23; comedy night at Sir Sam's Ski/Ride Aug. 25; and a divas dance party, featuring pop artist Dani Doucette, at the Haliburton Legion Aug. 26.

Pride week will conclude with a rainbow street festival and river parade Aug. 27. Guinan said there will be more than 20

vendors and entertainers along Water Street in Minden from 11 a.m., with various kids' activities and face painting planned. The river parade will commence at Rotary Park at noon.

This year's campaign slogan is 'love is love is love', which Guinan says captures the spirit of Minden Pride perfectly.

"Minden Pride, and this year's theme, I think really stands for acceptance of everyone. Letting people know they have a right to live in harmony and peace. That's our goal here," Guinan said. "All of us in the LGBTQ+ community just wants to live here and have safety and security. That's why this event is so necessary – to demonstrate that we are a vital and valid part of the local community."
